Agents Corner



The temperatures are finally warming up and there has been a lot going on to keep all Extension Agents on the Eastern Shore busy over the past month. Northampton ANR & 4-H enjoyed judging the Shore Christian School Science Fair on Thursday, May 5th. There were a lot of good, scientific based projects so judging was tough! Also in the month of May Northampton 4-H finished up Embryology projects in all of the schools. This year the schools got an option to hatch either ducks or chickens so it was fun seeing all of the excitement for the poultry/wildfowl. Accomack ANR & 4-H have set a date for the “2022 Farm Tour” for September 20, 2022. This is a program hosted at a local farm - WT Holland & Sons – where every 3rd grade student in Accomack County gets to learn about agriculture on a working farm. After a 2 year hiatus due to COVID we are excited that this program is coming back!

Pesticide Container Recycling –

On May 4th, we recycled pesticide jugs in 3 location throughout Northampton and Accomack Counties. A total of 9,180 lbs of plastic was recycled between all 3 locations. At this point, all recycling locations should be empty and able to take on more pesticide jugs. **Please remember to triple rinse the jugs and remove all caps and labels.** At the Northampton Landfill we still had a large issue with applicators leaving dirty pesticide jugs in our trailer and those jugs cannot be recycled. This is a free service, so please be considerate and have your employees follow the rules. 
Homeowner Well Water Testing –

Eastern Shore Sheep Shearing 2022

The Eastern Shore Sheep Shearing Program was held on May 18, 2022 and was highly successful in reducing shearing costs for sheep and goat owners this year. This VCE program contracts with Chamelin Shearing (Frederick, MD) to come and shear sheep and goats allowing for farm owners to cost-share while having a professional shearer visit the farm for this once-a-year shear. Nine farms participated in the Eastern Shore Sheep Shearing Program for a total of 48 ewes, 15 rams, 4 wethers and 3 goats to be sheared.





Father's Day first stemmed from a service in 1908, suggested by Grace Golden Clayton, to honor the 361 men who lost their lives in a West Virginia mining accident. Then, in 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd wanted to honor her father, William Smart, who was a Civil War veteran and widower raising six children.

The first official Father's Day was celebrated in 1910 in Washington State, but didn't become an official holiday until 1972. It is observed every year on the third Sunday in June. This year it falls on June 19th.




The summer solstice begins June 21st and is the longest day of the year for the Northern Hemisphere. It is when the North Pole is at its maximum tilt toward the sun. In the Southern Hemisphere, the June solstice marks the beginning of winter. The word "solstice" is derived from the Latin *solstitium* - Sol meaning sun and stitium meaning still or stopped.

Astrologically speaking, the Summer Solstice marks the first day of summer. Meteorologically speaking, June 1st marks the first day of the summer season.

This is the day of the year that your shadow will be the shortest because the sun is at its highest point in the sky. If you live in the tropics, you will not cast a shadow at all!


Midsummer's Day, generally celebrated in Europe, celebrates the mid-point of the growing season coinciding with the Summer Solstice.



The full strawberry moon occurs on June 14th and is the second super moon of 2022. Strawberry moon gets its name from Native Americans who marked this as the time that wild strawberries ripened.

Each month has a full moon theme and name, which is historically derived from Native Americans, Colonial or European sources, and used in the Old Farmer's Almanac.

Tommy Hines Receives Virginia Tech's Staff Career Achievement Award



Created in 2011 to recognize retiring staff members, the Staff Career Achievement Award is presented annually to individuals who retired the previous year and who distinguished themselves through exemplary performance and service during their university career. Mr. Hines' nominator praised his research and extension focus as well as his dedication to stakeholders, graduate students and the community. "Throughout Tommy's career, he has co-authored over 140 refereed articles and paper presentations, presented posters, and served on various committees for the Northeast Weed Science Society. For most staff, they do not focus on both local research needs and the extension of these research findings to professional societies. Mr. Hines commonly excelled at collecting applied research data, assisted with presenting information to farmers and industry stakeholders, and then carried through to ensure that professional societies were informed, such as the Northeast Weed Science Society (NEWSS). His longtime efforts with NEWSS led to him being inducted as Fellow to demonstrate his service to the NEWSS organization and industry. His 48-year legacy is certainly missed within our AREC, farming community, and throughout the Mid-Atlantic and northeast USA."

2022 EASTERN SHORE Household Water Quality Clinic

Does your water come from a well, spring, or cistern?

Do you want to learn more about the quality of your water and how to care for your water system?

How does it work?

1. Pick up a sample kit from your local County Extension office and get instructions on how to collect your household water sample.
2. Collect a sample from your tap at home and complete a short questionnaire.
3. Drop off sample at your local County Extension office.
4. About 4 weeks later, receive your confidential test results, an explanation of what the numbers mean, and information about how to handle any problems that are present. For more information, visit: <http://www.wellwater.bse.vt.edu/clinics.php>
